Uyuni Salt Flats

You are standing on a never-ending mirror. Looking up you see blue sky, fluffy white clouds and bright sunshine. Glancing down you see everything perfectly reflected below your feet. You have nothing around you except endless sky. This may sound like some kind of dream, but in a mountainous region of South America 'the world's largest mirror' actually 1)

Landscape

The Uyuni Salt Flats are in the south-west of Bolivia. An enormous white desert, the flats formed when ancient lakes dried up and left only salt behind. The Incahuasi island, a huge mound of cactus and coral in the centre of the flats, reminds us of what was 2) here. In the dry season, the salt is hard and cracked, but the rainy season is unlike anything else, as a thin layer of water sits on top of the salt, creating a magical mirror effect. The salt flats are 3,500 metres above sea level and cover over 10,000 square kilometres – you can even see them from space! In fact, NASA uses this large flat surface to check the location of its satellites

Exploring the Flats

Travel by plane or bus to the city of Uyuni if you want to experience this natural wonder. The flats are huge, so it's best to discover them by **3**) a Jeep tour. On these 4-day adventures be prepared – the sun's rays are very powerful and can be harmful when they're reflecting off the white ground, so you need sunglasses and sunscreen during the day. At night, there is an enormous drop in temperature. It can get below freezing point, so warm clothes are also a must.

While out in the Jeeps, don't expect to buy souvenirs as there are certainly no shops here. Addicted to your smartphone? If so, post an update before you go, because there's no Wi-Fi or phone signal for the entire trip. Even electricity is only available for a few hours each night because the lodges you sleep in 4) on small solar panels.

The Kadayawan Festival is an annual event that is held in the city of Davao in the Philippines. It is a celebration of life and a way of giving thanks for nature's harvest each year.

The festival's name comes from the word "madayaw," meaning "valuable". In the past, local people would display the produce from of their harvest – fruit and vegetables, flowers and grains – outside their homes, and sing and dance in the streets as a way to thank nature for the gifts it had offered them. Over the years, this local tradition grew into an organised event. In 1988, it was officially named the Kadayawan Festival by Mayor Rodrigo Duterte. Since then, it has become one of the biggest annual events in the Philippines. Now, both locals and tourists fill the streets of Davao every August to enjoy the delicious food and lively music of the festival.

There are loads of fantastic performances and parades for you to enjoy during this week-long celebration, but one of the highlights is Indak-Indak sa Kadalanan; the costumes and dances of the different Mindanao communities that take part are simply amazing. Some of the performances invite visitors to get involved – so remember to pack your dancing shoes! Once you've worked up an appetite, be sure to try the local cuisine, especially the delicious fresh fruit and sweet desserts. If you're a shopaholic, the Kadayawan Festival is the place for you. There are hundreds of market stalls and shops where you can buy souvenirs to remind you of your trip, as well as gifts for your friends and family back home.

There is so much to see and do at the Kadayawan Festival that it's a good idea to plan ahead. Have a look at the programme beforehand and decide which events you really don't want to miss. Make a note of the day and time of these events so that you're not disappointed. The markets, for example, are only open at the weekend, and some of the performances run every second day. However, you don't have to be too strict with your schedule. The whole point of the festival is to go with the flow, so if you see something that sparks your interest, just enjoy it!

D The festival takes place in various locations all over the city so you'll be doing a lot of walking. August in the Philippines is rainy, but it will also be very hot. Remember to wear comfortable shoes and carry an umbrella or a waterproof

Because of the heat and all of the activity you'll be doing, it's easy to get thirsty, so it's a good idea to have a bottle of water with you.
